Dear Secretary Lutnick:

We enthusiastically support the nomination of David Boundy to be appointed to the Patent Public Advisory Committee (PPAC).

PTAAARMIGAN the organization and we individual signatories represent a broad spectrum of patent holders, intellectual property attorneys, corporate legal departments, universities and research institutions, and support staff who interact with the USPTO **on a daily basis,** both verbally and online.

Mr. Boundy checks all the boxes for this committee. David's decades of multi-faceted experience in patents both domestic and abroad make him an incomparable asset to the PPAC. From representing individual inventors to companies large and small, as well as licensees and licensors, plaintiffs and defendants, he conquers challenges—and offers solutions—from every angle.

What sets Mr. Boundy apart is his even-tempered approach to challenges from varying perspectives while adhering uncompromisingly to Congress' laws. David's approach to commercial transactions, regulatory affairs, and mentoring among the patent community integrate multiple perspectives, creating win-win-win scenarios for all.

While his self-nomination under separate cover satisfies the technical requirements for appointment, this letter of support provides a different perspective. We are the ones in the

In your confirmation hearing, you highlighted how American ingenuity will be crucial to putting America first:

- "winning the AI race" while minimizing American vulnerabilities to foreign cyberattacks
- reclaiming, monetizing and protecting semiconductor manufacturing in America
- maximizing the promises of the CHIPS and Science Act, and the BEAD program
- leading the world in 5G and 6G

We applaud David for envisioning a more effective and efficient USPTO that knowledgeably protects innovation in all those areas, while balancing the needs of all actors. One thing we all can agree on is that a highly-functioning, state-of-the-art USPTO will be essential to harnessing and rewarding innovation. Could "growing the pie" be this simple?

His ability to see these cooperative opportunities is why David is revered by his peers and should be your number one appointment. He addresses the immediate challenges as well as anticipates the potential, intricate legal ramifications that lie years and even decades down the road. While it may seem trivial, today's easily-solvable hiccup, poorly-reasoned decision, or poorly-considered rule affecting processing and examination of applications affects issuance and timing of patents. Patents mediate thousands of private transactions, and billions of dollars in technological investment. Small issues accumulate into delay that mounts the backlog and in turn damages the American economy. David will bring his full-landscape knowledge to PPAC to help the USPTO balance administrative cost with the full spectrum of future economic effect and American innovation.

We advocate for David as the unique voice to offer win-win-win solutions for the administration, USPTO leadership and frontline staff, as well as us—the "customers."

David understands, as do we, that the USPTO should be a well-orchestrated team of systems and people, workloads and compensation. Perhaps most importantly, he understands that the USPTO needs to attract and retain sophisticated talent at government wages.
